# FOR IMPROVING BRIDGE PLAYERS CONSTRUCTIVE BIDDING

I take it you all understand the straight forward opener – responder points sequence, whereby opener's rebids show whether the opening hand is minimum, strong, or very strong, and responder's methods of showing strength and support.

So this newsletter comment will only look at opening in 3<sup>rd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> seats.

## Opening in 3<sup>rd</sup>seat

The opening has gone - Partner(dealer) Opponent You
Pass Pass ?

With a minimum strength or better hand there is no problem – bid normally as if in first seat. However with lesser values should you open light?

In 3<sup>rd</sup> seat there are 3 reasons for opening light if hand is suitable -

- It can help partner select a good opening lead;
- It can be usefully obstructive. You know your partnership is unlikely to have game values and the 4<sup>th</sup>or another suit player is likely to have game values. If you bid they will have to use defensive bidding and may cause them to misjudge their combined strength.
- Your side may win the auction and gain a part score or secure a successful sacrifice.

#### ALWAYS HAVE A GOOD REASON FOR OPENING LIGHT.

Guidelines on whether you should open light in 3<sup>rd</sup> seat are -

- Will you be able to handle partner's most likely response if not **PASS**.
- Your call should be based on a good suit, as lead direction is main reason for opening "light"
- Opening with a major is more obstructive than bidding a minor. Sometimes, if not vulnerable, opening with a very strong 4 card major holding is a good strategy.
- Watch vulnerability, when vulnerable do not open light, and do not open with a 4 card major holding.
- For a "light" 3<sup>rd</sup> seat opening, have a minimum strength of 9+ total points.

As the opening may be light the partnership should have the following agreements –

- A full strength hand is indicated if opener rebids 1NT or 2NT, or another suit.
- A 2 level response in a new suit will promise at least a good 5 card holding.
- The Drury convention should be used to check whether opening was normal or "light".

For 3<sup>rd</sup> seat openings most partnerships agree to relax requirements for openings, including pre-emptive 3 level openings, if not vulnerable, and this can include a good 6 card suit.

### **OPENING IN 4th SEAT**

In 4<sup>th</sup> seat after 3 passes, open normally with a good standard opening hand. With hands of 10, 11 or 12 HCP's, you know your LHO is not waiting with a big hand to bid, so you should only open if you are going to get a positive score. Guide lines are next.

Guide lines are -

- If opening hand is weak in the majors, be wary of opening as opponents may bid a major and make their contract, when a pass from you would have resulted in a better score for you.
- Use the Rule of 15 if you have a borderline strength hand. You count HCP's and add one for each spade card held. If total is 13 or less pass. If total is 14 opening is optional, and if total is 15+, you should generally open.
- A weak 2 opening in a major, must have slightly more strength than normal, to ensure you make your contract. Partner will be aware of this and will only invite or bid game if he has better than normal values to bid.
