## **Bridge Notes for the Improving Player**

## **Always Revalue as the Auction Proceeds**

Some features of a hand may significantly improve or lessen in value in light of the bidding during the auction. The worth of your HCP may change considerably. Experts do count points. But they are not slaves to the point count. They adjust their evaluation of the hand as the bidding progresses.

Failure to follow this sound advice and revalue when appropriate is a frequent cause of bidding mistakes.

A common weakness – especially among newer players – is not revaluing after a good suit fit (8 cards of better) with partner becomes evident. Occasionally the trump fit itself is not recognized. Either of these oversights can prove costly.

<u>Comment:</u> Opposite a INT overall promising a balanced hand with 15-18 HCP and one stopper at least in the suit opened. South should appreciate he has an 8+ card fit with partner in the heart suit.

As soon as this is realized, South should revalue his hand counting HCP plus shortage points. As South is now worth 11 points (7 HCP + 4 shortage points) it is clearcut to bid game -4H

If South fails to recognize the heart fit or doesn't revalue the hand properly, a good game contract could be missed.

Some partnerships use transfers over a 1NT opening bid and in this case South would bid 2D for North to transfer to 2H, and then in the sound bidding case, South would bid 4H, and the strong hand would be declarer and thus not tabled as dummy where the defenders can pick possible weaknesses.

In English pubs, ale is ordered in pints and quarts. So in Old England, when customers got unruly, the bartender would yell at them "Mind your pints and quarts, and settle down".

It's where we get the phrase "mind your P's and Q's.

<u>Comment:</u> With primary support for responder's spade suit, opener should carefully revalue his hand before deciding on an appropriate rebid. Here, West's hand is now worth 20 points (16 HCP's + 4 for shortages). As partner's response would promise 6+ points, West rebid should be **4S** – not an invitational jump raise to the 3 level.

It is worth noting that once the spade fit is found, West should asses his hand as having 5 losers (2 spades, 1 heart, 1 diamond, and 1 club). West should also appreciate that even if the responder has minimum values for the one level reply, partner's hand will usually contribute at least two tricks – thus reducing the total of losers to 3.

<u>Comment:</u> A simple overcall at the two level promises – about 10 - 12 HCP and a 5 card holding with a suit quality of 8 or more.

Here south with excellent heart support, should carefully revalue his hand and see it is worth 12 points (9HCP + 3 shortage). The bidding indicates SJ could be worthless so is not included in South's point count. So South advancing to **3H** to invite game is clearly warranted. It's a serious mistake for South not to revalue and see game potential, and to pass. For more information on this topic see Ross Dick's book "Common Bidding Mistakes to Avoid"
