Competitions:

On Sunday May 21st, Moreton Bribie Bridge Club hosted the annual teams challenge event against Caboolture Bridge Club. We are excited to say that Caboolture brought home the shield this year. Well done to our top performing team: Geraldine, Margaret, Kate and Maureen.

One team comprising Margie, Pete, Deb and Gary have had success at both the Barrier Reef Congress and the recent Moreton Bribie Congress – well done.

These and other members continue to seek events outside our club for added experience (and often financial reward), something many more of us should possibly be doing.

On Sunday July 23rd we will be hosting the annual Caboolture-Redcliffe interclub comp. We will hopefully have 16 pairs from each club competing. We look forward to an enjoyable day of bridge.

The new 2017 Laws of Duplicate Bridge come into effect for Australia and New Zealand on 1st August 2017.

Although the main impact of the new laws will be felt by Directors, here are few preliminary items of player interest:

- Law 9: Dummy now has the right to try to prevent any irregularity (such as a lead from the wrong hand), irrespective of whom the potential perpetrator might be. However, once an infraction has occurred, dummy is still prohibited from calling attention to it until after the conclusion of the play.
- Law 20: A player who realises that they have given a wrong or incomplete explanation of partner's call is no longer required to immediately proffer a correction, but they must still call the Director and make the correction prior to the facing of the opening lead. It will however generally be in the player's best interests to call the Director
- When a player makes a claim or concession, that player is now required to face his hand and both sides (all four players) may now agree to continue play, rather than summon the Director. However, if they do agree to play on, then the table result will stand. Alternatively if they elect to call the Director then all play ceases and the claim is adjudicated as per the current laws.

Keep an eye on the ABF magazines for further explanations of rule changes.

And please remember LAW 74 - CONDUCT AND ETIQUETTE

Proper Attitude

A player should maintain a courteous attitude at all times.

A player should carefully avoid any remark or extraneous action that might cause annoyance or embarrassment to another player or might interfere with the enjoyment of the game.

Every player should follow uniform and correct procedure in calling and playing.

The ABF recently released figures about masterpoints and the percentage of ABF members in each section. Below is the table of ABF masterpoints and percentages against Caboolture Club and the percentage of our members in each area.

As you can see we certainly are above the average in the 100-300 range but below in the next 2 categories. Of course with all those players heading off to congresses around the place we may see an increase over the next few years.

Bridge tips by

A new suit at the 3 level is forcing.

Most pairs play this chestnut as true: though there are exceptions. Its logic is based on the fact that three level bids occupy a lot of space.

To play them as non-forcing makes for "tortured" auctions when you would like a sequence to be forcing. e.g.

$$1H - (2S) - 3C$$

Here, the opposition has made a weak jump overcall, cramping our bidding space. Of course, there are hands where responder is long in clubs and very weak. With those hands, you would like to be able to bid 3C for partner to pass. However, there are a great many other hands where you will be unsure of the final contract and need more information from opener. Hence, most pairs play the 3C above as forcing; (2S) - 3C

This time, you have overcalled their weak 2S bid. You are showing the values for a solid overcall at the two level. Partner will have to decide whether to bid or not.

Here, opener is showing a strong red hand, probably 5-5. Responder is obliged to find a bid – return to 3H, 3S (six carder), 3NT(must have clubs stopped) or bid 4D.

Here, opener is obliged to find another bid. He may feel that he has described his hand already. However, responder hasn't had enough yet!

It would require a specific agreement to be able to pass this jump response. Most pair play it as forcing for one round.

$$(1H) - X - (2H) - 3C$$

(P) - ?

Most pairs would not play 3C as forcing here. 3C is simply showing a response to partner's double. The 3C is probably about 5-9 HCP with five clubs

A change of suit by an unpassed responder is forcing.

This chestnut is by partnership agreement. It is meant to apply to uncontested auctions which haven't started with 1NT or a pre-empt. (When our auctions start with 1NT or a pre-empt, our responses have different meanings).

Here is a typical auction where opener must keep bidding. Responder's hand is unlimited. On the contrary:

This 2D bid "begs to be dropped".

Responder has shown less than 10 HCP, at least 6 diamonds and hopeless holdings in opener's black suits.

Whether 2D is forcing depends on partnership agreement. Here, the opponents have overcalled at the two level showing a goodish hand.

Many pairs play 2D here as a Negative Free Bid showing about 8-11 HCP and a 5 card suit, not forcing.
