Director's Corner

CHANGING CALLS DURING PLAY AND BIDDING

The three situations which will be discussed here can occur either in the auction period or during play.

Can changes be allowed to rectify the error?

The director must be called in each case to explain your options.

1. UNINTENDED CALL during bidding - Law 25

Should a player realise that he has made a bid which he had never intended to make, he may be able to alter that bid **provided that his partner has not subsequently made a bid.** The director may speak with

the bidder away from the table to ensure that a mistake has not been made. **The unintended bid should never have been considered**. However, if the changed bid is not accepted by the Director, then the LHO may still choose to accept this changed bid.

If the changed bid is withdrawn, the information is authorised for the non-offending side, but **NOT** authorised for the offending side. ie: A player of an offending side may not choose a call or play that is demonstrably suggested over another by unauthorised information if the other call or play is a logical alternative.


2. UNINTENDED CALL BY DECLARER FROM DUMMY - Law 45

Law 45C 4[b] states that Declarer, on realising that he has made a mistake (by a slip of the tongue, **NOT** a loss of concentration) in calling for an unintended designation from dum my, then, yes, he may change this call **providing that he has not subsequently played from his hand**. The director must be very sure that the declarer had never considered this call .A defender's card may be returned to their hand if the declarer's play changes.

3. UNINTENDED PLAY FROM DUMMY Law 45

Law 45D 1 states that should dummy play a card that had not been named by declarer, then this card may be withdrawn and the correct card be played provided that each side has not played to the next trick. Again, in this case, the non offending side may withdraw their play. Should this happen, then Declarer may then subsequently change his play as well, should he desire.

How Things Have Changed!

My Bridge Experiences

My introduction to this wonderful game began in early 1980.

My mother was a bridge player and demanded that I learn to play bridge. I was a busy working mother with three children and I felt that Bridge was the last thing I needed.

However, to keep Mother happy, I enrolled in a course of six lessons in Acol at the Dalby Bridge Club, at the conclusion of which I was expected to play in Club events. I can assure you that "suffer the beginner" was not practiced in those days and that the experienced players showed no mercy. It was a case of improve to survive – or suffer the indignity of the scathing performance reviews!

I still recall with the horror, my ill-conceived overcall of 1NT – holding 12 HCP's (the Acol system) but completely disregarding the opening bid of 1H. Having no cover in Hearts, I endured the humiliation of making 2 tricks! My stress level was off the Richter scale.

The Dalby Bridge Club played twice weekly in the Dalby Croquet Club rooms and as I was working – the only option for me was to play on Tuesday evenings. This required me to travel 45kms into Dalby on a lonely dark country road – mainly inhabited by kangaroos. There were no mobile phones. I had a 2-way radio which wasn't of great assistance to me when a kangaroo landed on the bonnet of my car at midnight.

I was most fortunate in that a highly regarded State player, Enid Busch from Toowoomba, took me under her wing and became my mentor. She introduced me to the Standard American system and the more in-depth intricacies of competitive Bridge. Any expertise I have at the Bridge table today is a tribute to her patient belief in me.

In time I was elected Club President and Director of the Dalby Bridge Club. There were no computer programmes or Bridgemates used for scoring. Scores were entered manually and the event scoring undertaken manually after the event (usually finishing around midnight.) Eventually, Dr. Reg Busch — the father of Peter Busch introduced the first Compscore programme which was the forerunner to our current Compscore 2 programme.

The benefit of manual scoring was that all players were able to score competently.

I should also add that bidding pads were not in vogue and all bids were verbal, which required disciplined concentration.

Country Clubs – including the Dalby Bridge Club ran very social Congresses in those days. The venue was the Dalby Show Ground Hall. A roast meal was served on Saturday evening prior to the second round of play. You can imagine the organisation involved - but country people just got in, supported the Club and proudly displayed their culinary skills with tasty treats available for players throughout the weekend.



During my Presidency, the Dalby Bridge Club raised substantial funds through very hard work and the highly anticipated Clubhouse was opened in 1989. Tony & I try to visit the Club's annual congress weekend each February.

At the end of 1980 — I left Dalby and as my life had moved into other areas of interest, I decided not to involve myself with Bridge for a short time. This divorce from Bridge lasted 20 years.

In 2008, the Bridge bug started to bite me. I joined Joan Butt's Bridge Club in Clayfield, believing I would need to join one of her beginners' classes. She assured me this would not be necessary. I was amazed

to find that when I sat at a Bridge table after all of those years, the knowledge was still there and I have never looked back since.



I moved to Beachmere in 2010, and joined the Bribie Bridge Club where I served on the Committee for 2 years and was the Club President for one term.

Tony approached me with a proposal that we trial a bridge partnership. The rest is history.

I now enjoy membership and interaction with many friends at the Caboolture Club. It will be a sad day for me when I can no longer play this amazing, challenging, rewarding game.

Tony and I regularly attend Bridge workshops to improve our system. The one thing I understand very clearly is "reward for effort." The pursuit of self-improvement and a greater understanding of the finer points of Bridge can really make a difference.

Club Improvements

Our water cooler was recently replaced due to some heavy usage and subsequent failure of the dispensing spout. After much research a new one was sourced with significant savings - Thanks Dave.

Peter Gruythuysen built a vented cover to conceal the rear workings. It looks great, good work Peter.

Despite Covid, some of our members are still managing to get out and about. Others have sadly had their travel plans thwarted by the recent state lockdowns.


Rhonda and her husband had a great week in the Bunya Mountains enjoying the scenery and wild life. The rain did not dampen their enthusiasm.










