As Mitch mentioned in his report Roy will be in charge of the repair to the outside ramp and railing. Main features are:

Remove bottom rail where cut short, near top section of ramp. Fix  $100mm \times 45mm$  treated timber softwood rail., (approximately 2.4 m)

Fix 100mm x 45mm treated timber softwood rail (approximately 1.5 m) to lower section of ramp.

Cut and fit stainless steel wire (with all necessary fittings)

All rails will be prepared for sanding and painting according to the specified quote.

Following discussion, your committee voted in favour to accept the given quote. It is expected that work will commence in September.

There will be no disruption to regular bridge sessions while the work is in progress. Roy Bone

West leads S2 against your 45 contract.
Your goal is to have just one trump loser!
What card do you play from dummy?
You should play S6. The SJ only works if West started with KQ2 in which case S2 would be a crazy lead.

Having played S6, East produces SQ which you grab with the SA.

What is your next play?

**♣**J7

**♠**9843

You should play small towards 57 or run the 59. Why?

Because there is one trump that you can be sure East doesn't hold. That is ST.

Holding that card, East would have played it rather than the SQ because he can see SJ in dummy.

You will still be in the soup if West started with KT52, giving him two trump tricks no matter what you do.

However, your play is rewarded when the

layout is

**♦**J76

**↑**T52

**♠** KQ

**♠** *A* 9843

Notice how much tougher it is if East plays SK at trick one. You should still take the same line as a tough East holding KT will not part with his SK.

If West hadn't started trumps for you, SA should be your first play. Note that East drops an honour and then play the same way. If he has the other top honour, it will "beat the air". If he shows out, you are no worse off.

One of Britain's leading bridge players died immediately after being dealt a 'once in a lifetime' hand because she 'couldn't take the excitement'.

Wendy Brown, 80, collapsed in front of friends while playing a remarkable 29-point game but even her heartbroken son admitted today:

'It was a lovely way for her to go'.

The grandmother of 12 suffered heart failure at the John Betjeman Centre in Wadebridge, Cornwall, during her regular Tuesday night bridge night.

Bereft friends said today they were in shock, but admitted it is the 'perfect bridge player's death'. In the panic nobody checked her cards but she may have had four aces, four kings, and a jack - almost unheard of in bridge circles.

She had played the game for five decades and achieved the hallowed status of Premier Life Master, but experts said today a 29-point game is so rare it is unlikely she ever had one.

Her son Charlie said: 'I can imagine the smile on her face when she looked at her cards and she knew she had a winning hand. She died doing what she loved to do.

'The other members of the bridge club responded magnificently and tried everything to revive her. 'But when all is said and done, it was a lovely way to go.

West led the king of clubs and East played the jack, won by Helgemo with the ace. He cashed the ace of hearts and the king and ace of diamonds, then cashed the king of hearts, then led the nine of spades from dummy ... and ran it! This astonishing first-round finesse was required, as you will see, from the end position that arose.

equivalent of the queen.

A spade to the jack came next, and with six cards remaining Helgemo led the king of spades from his hand. West had three master cards in hearts and three in clubs, and had to find a discard on this round of trumps. Since North had three low hearts and South had three low clubs, whatever West did would prove fatal. If he discarded a heart, Helgemo would overtake the king of spades with dummy's ace. Then he would ruff a heart, ruff a club, ruff a heart, ruff a club and dummy's last heart would be a winner at trick 13. If instead West threw a club, Helgemo would allow the king of spades to hold in his own hand. He would ruff a club, ruff a heart, ruff a club, ruff a heart, and his last club would be a winner at trick 13. An entry-shifting trump squeeze involving a seemingly unnecessary finesse in trumps - but if you follow the play of this incredible deal closely, you will see that the contract would have had no chance if declarer had cashed the ace of spades before leading through East's Queen.
